Our entry-level OTD program is carried out in the context of an urban research university, reflecting UIC's commitment to diversity, social justice and community engagement. You'll get an education that prepares you to integrate occupational therapy practice, theory and research using our Scholarship of Practice (SOP) model. Learn occupational therapy evaluation and treatment skills in student-centered lecture/discussion, lab and fieldwork courses. Complete your doctoral capstone with the support of your SOP Collaborative, a faculty-led group of students pursuing scholarly work in a specific area. Become a leader and advocate to serve individuals, families, groups and communities across the life span and in a wide variety of settings.



# Apply the theory and skills learned in the classroom

Our fieldwork experiences include:

- Level IA: Explore a variety of community-based and clinical occupational therapy settings
- Level IB: Address the psychological and social needs of clients in a community agency
- Level IC and ID: Develop professional behaviors, practice skills and an understanding of psychosocial issues influencing engage-ment in occupation
- Level IIA and IIB: Apply theory, clinical reasoning and skills to become a competent entry-level occupational therapist

### Admission requirements

Our thorough holistic admission process uses a balanced and equitable approach that considers multiple factors, including experience, background and personal characteristics, as well as traditional metrics such as grades and test scores.

- Bachelor's degree (in any subject) or Guaranteed Professional Program Admissions for high school students
- 3.0 GPA minimum on a 4.0 scale for all bachelor's degree and graduate coursework is recommended (a B average)
- Completion of all prerequisite courses with a grade of B- or better in each course, unless there are special circumstances
- Recorded volunteer, work and extracurricular experiences; 50 hours of OT observation or volunteer work is recommended

#### Accreditation

The Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) has granted UIC's entry-level OTD program Preaccreditation Status and conducted an initial on-site evaluation in September 2024. UIC's E-OTD program must be granted Accreditation Status before its graduates are eligible to sit for the national certification examination for the occupational therapist administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). UIC will learn ACOTE's decision regarding accreditation of the entry-level-OTD program in December 2024, in advance of the graduation of the first entry-level OTD cohort in May 2025.
